YES to Nature Preservation for Gondar Gardens Reservoir Ask yourself ... Ask the developer ...

- 1. Does West Hampstead have enough green space? Can we afford to lose a vital green lung, forever?
- 2. Who has the moral right to destroy Camden's only known slow worm habitat and home to four "red listed" birds and other "under threat" species?
- 3. With 1,000 new homes approved within ½ mile of the site since 2011, and more planned around the stations, is this proposal necessary or just greedy?
- 4. In an area described by Camden as suffering from "parking stress", do we need more cars?
- 5. Do we need more traffic? And will the difficult Gondar Gardens / Mill Lane junction be safe?
- 6. Are the hundreds of open views into and across the site a valuable asset to the community?

- 1. Why aren't they content with a 'frontage' only development, with the London Wildlife Trust managing the remaining 93% of the site?
- 2. Have they found any wildlife group interested in 33% of the site when 93% is a viable option?
- 3. Do they agree the site is designated as Open Space and a Site of Nature Conservation Importance?
- 4. Why should these designations be overturned when a Planning Inspector has said the frontage scheme would secure the SNCI for the community?
- 5. How high would buildings rise above the reservoir roof? 5.5m is more than "one and a half storeys"!
- 6. Where would 250 more people go to the doctor or send their kids to school? What other impacts?

What we have learnt

- The whole site has ecological value the grassland supports insects, birds and slow worms
- Building in the centre destroys most of the Open Space against Camden policy
- Building on the frontage destroys public views across the Open Space against Camden policy
- Building on both leaves too little land for a viable Nature Conservation site says the London Wildlife Trust
- Camden is exceeding its housing targets; and Feb 2015 figures show lower projected demand in Camden
- Gondar Gardens has much worse access to public transport than the 'interchange' sites by the stations
- No-one is making any more green Open Space and there are better brownfield sites for housing
